"How I came into the camp ..."

Krystyna Czajkowska (Number 913):

My sister Maria, my brother Janusz and I came into the camp because we had set fire to the farmstead of a German farmer to revenge our mother who had been beaten up by him.

Apolonia Beda :

I was working for a German woman. One day I inadvertently tuned the radio to a Polish broadcasting station. They were just broadcasting a speech by General Sikorski. Unfortunately, my ethnic German came into the room - and got angry. I was brought to the police station the same day. During my interrogation I was beaten. I was not allowed to go back home again. A couple of days later I was taken to the camp at the ulica Przemysłowa.

Regina Kibilska:

On 14 July 1943 my father, Józef Olszacki was arrested because of his underground activities in the resistance movement and imprisoned at Auschwitz. I was taken to the Gestapo-quarters at the ulica Kilińskiego 152 together with my younger sister Anna. We were interrogated in order to extract the names of persons who our father had been in contact with. We were brought to the camp at the ulica Przemysłowa where I was assigned the number 3712 instead of a name.
